LegaSea was officially launched on the 9th February this year. I was honoured to introduce our Council's latest initiative to around 90 people in Auckland. Fisheries Management Committee Report

Peter Campbell, Chairman

As Chairman of the New Zealand Sport Fishing Council's Fisheries Management Committee I would like to thank my Committee and Council colleagues for their efforts over the past twelve months. Committee members include John Chibnall, Mark Connor, Wayne Bicknell and myself.

A special thank you to Mark Hemingway, who has stepped down from the Fisheries Management Committee due to other commitments.

In July 2011 the Ministry of Fisheries merged with the Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry. As of April 2012 this organisation has been renamed the Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI), whose objective is to grow New Zealand by, in part, maximising export opportunities.

Despite the changes, it is particularly pleasing for our members and supporters that this Council continues to develop submissions and messages based on Fisheries Act (1996) principles. There is a growing realisation that we need to maximise the benefits from the investment made in the Kahawai Legal Challenge, and subsequent Supreme Court ruling.

Also there has been a fundamental shift - from being mainly reactive, to taking a more proactive role through promoting policy and principles that seek to achieve 'more fish in the water'.

The Committee looks forward to discussing the first of those policies, for Snapper 1, at the Council's 2012 Annual General Meeting.

Summary of activities

A brief summary of Fisheries Management Committee activities for the year ending 30th June 2012:

- 16 submissions developed and tendered for review, in response to -
 - Fisheries management proposals;
 - Draft Fisheries Plans;
 - Foreign Charter Vessel Inquiry;
 - Draft Auckland Plan, by Auckland City Council;
 - Western and Central Pacific Fisheries Commission (WCPFC) proposals;
 - Local management initiatives; and
 - Draft Marine Protected Areas policy, by the Environmental Defence Society (EDS).
- Met and maintained correspondence with the Minister and senior Ministry for Primary Industries officials regarding management, policy and engagement issues.
 - Attended at least 43 meetings and developed reports as required -
 - Attended or supported member's attendance at MPI regional recreational fisheries forum meetings.
 - Supported representatives at Wellington-based policy meetings and regional fisheries management meetings.
 - Regularly attended MPI Science Working Group meetings to keep up with the latest developments, like progress on the national recreational harvest survey and research on a variety of species including Highly Migratory Species (HMS), Blue Cod, Bluenose, Snapper, Kahawai, Tarakihi, Trevally, Gurnard, Kingfish, and baitfish like Jack Mackerel.
- Improved public awareness of Fisheries Management activities through regular publication of reports in print and online media.

Snapper 1 policy

By all measures Snapper 1 (SNA1) is the largest recreational fishery in New Zealand. A management review of SNA1 is likely in 2013. The Council will need a clear and united position before engaging in the consultation process, so the Fisheries Management Committee has drafted a Snapper 1 policy. This will be considered and debated during the 2012 AGM.

If the policy is successfully adopted by Council we anticipate developing policies for other fish stocks. The Fisheries Management Committee welcomes your suggested priority stocks for consideration.

Marine protection

There is lobbying to have new legislation enacted that will encompass much broader aspects of marine protection than the now-stalled Marine Reserves Bill. The Fisheries Management Committee (FMC) will monitor progress with interest and advise when and if NZSFC participation is required.

In October 2011 Stuart Ryan issued a NZSFC submission on the Auckland Council's Draft Auckland Plan. Stuart and Scott Macindoe appeared for the NZSFC at the Auckland Council's November hearings.

Wide-ranging measures are also proposed in the draft Hauraki Gulf marine spatial plan. The FMC continues to actively participate in developments, as the Gulf is a significant area within Fisheries Management Area 1, and because of the clarifications of statutory duty to manage abundant fisheries in the Hauraki Gulf, as per the Kahawai proceedings.

LegaSea launch

The New Zealand Sport Fishing Council officially launched LegaSea in February 2012. Around 90 people attended the day's events held at Oram's Marine & Conference Centre, in Auckland.

Approximately 70 people attended the Northland Iaunch held at the Whangarei Deep Sea Anglers Club, in Tutukaka, at the end of March.

LegaSea's vision is simple -

"more fish in the water for future generations".

Its objective is to raise funds from the public to support the Council's work to protect and enhance our current and future fishing interests.

This will be achieved by directing funds to four workstreams:

- ADVOCACY
- EDUCATION

RESEARCH

working TOGETHER.

Public awareness

Public awareness is essential to LegaSea's success.

A website www.legasea.co.nz has been established, complimented by channels on Twitter, YouTube and an active Facebook presence www.facebook.com/LegaSea

As a Council we appreciate the hours of effort being made by a keen band of volunteers and we welcome Matt Watson's fulsome support for LegaSea. His promotion of LegaSea through online channels, media statements and television has brought much valued publicity to this initiative.

While progress was initially slower than expected there is now a steady stream of support and awareness.

Advocacy

In addition to the submissions, meeting attendances, public awareness initiatives and the quarterly FMC reports, the Fisheries Management Committee have overseen the development of the Promotional Packs - compiled to enhance your chance of success when seeking sponsorship.

In these Packs are 1-page, easy-to-read Fish Files covering a range of topics and Council achievements that you, as members, can rightly claim as your own. Moreover, they are a means to publicly recognise and celebrate the effort by past and present members to achieve reasonable access to abundant fisheries. www.nzsportfishing.org.nz - Management - Promotional-Pack.

Research

There is a new section on the NZSFC website. It is updated regularly to improve your access to reports and research papers. A Blue Water Marine Research Billfish tagging report was released in January 2012. Also online is the Kingfish Monitoring project report and the NZ Marine Research Foundation Yellowfin Tuna report. www.nzsportfishing.org.nz - Management – Research & science – Reports.

Education

In anticipation of the Animal Welfare Act review the NZSFC submitted and succeeded, in part, with a funding application for a research and education project 'Best Practice Fish Catching and Handling for Recreational Fishers'. The review is underway and a submission has been drafted.

Working Together

The advent of LegaSea has given the Fisheries Management Committee and its service providers more opportunity to work TOGETHER with organisations such as Greenpeace, to achieve common objectives. It was pleasing to have Greenpeace actively participating and presenting their material during the LegaSea launch in Auckland. In late March we were able to support the Greenpeace 'Save our Tuna' campaign, which successfully sought to put pressure on decision-makers to take a more precautionary approach when managing Pacific tuna stocks.

Future Search

There are varying degrees of understanding around the New Zealand Recreational Fishing Council's Future Search initiative. The NZRFC's Strategic Plan outlines the process to establish a statutory body. A Future Search conference is being held in Nelson, in February 2013, to "collaboratively agree a vision for the future of recreational fishing in New Zealand and agree actions to make it real".

At our AGM in 2010 NZSFC members discussed the potential of an overarching body to represent non-commercial fishing interests. The AGM voted against the establishment of a statutory body and the inevitable licensing of recreational fishers. Further discussions have occurred since then.

Our Council is committed to a voluntary advocacy model and has initiated LegaSea to inspire public support for the work we do. The New Zealand Sport Fishing Council has had no involvement in the NZRFC's Future Search process and does not anticipate participating in the Nelson event.

Conclusion

There have been some exciting developments this year, including the launch of LegaSea and initiating projects such as the Snapper 1 policy. Fostering regular contact with the Minister for Primary Industries and senior officials will hopefully streamline our engagement and reap long-term benefits for our fisheries.

As the Fisheries Management Committee it is often challenging to achieve the desired outcomes, given the financial constraints and when working within the club, zone and management structure. However, it is because of this robust process that our Committee can confidently operate with external agencies and our service providers.

The Committee anticipates that you will be impressed with how your affiliation fees have been invested during the past year, the achievements and the positive direction being taken by the New Zealand Sport Fishing Council to achieve 'more fish in the water'.
